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Betula utilis 'Grayswood Ghost' -Clean birch with power wash or brush to get bright white bark in the winter



Acer griseum - Great small garden tree perfect for all seasons, not just for winter.

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Acer 'Sangu-Kaku' - Superb Japanese maple best grown against a dark hedge such you're your neighbours Leyland cypress...

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*Cornus sanguinea* 'Annies Winter Orange', Arguably one of the recent introductions of stem Cornus

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Cornus alba 'Sibirica'

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When planting Cornus think about alternate times of year, plant a variegated form to extend the season from the same plant.

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Salix a gracilistylus 'Mt Aso'

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Rubus cockburnianus 'Goldenvale' The ghost bramble is a great addition, cut back in March/April and enjoy the beautiful golden new growth, mulch after pruning.

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Phyllostachys aureosulcata 'Spectabilis'

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Hollys need a male and female to produce fruit, Kingsville special is a hermaphrodite producing its own fruit without the need of a male!

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Daphne 'Jacqueline Postill' is one of the best Daphne's on the market, beautiful fragrance and easy to grow...prefers to have its roots moist all year (not waterlogged)

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Daphne odora 'Rebecca'

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*Edgeworthis chrysantha* - A great addition to the woodland garden, best not grown in a frost pocket. The wood from this beauty is used to make Chinese currency

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Hamamelis mollis 'Brevipetala', in my opinion a great garden plant, good colour for the winter garden.



Hamamelis x intermedia 'Pallida' – Great fragrance but a difficult colour to compliment in the garden.

*Stachyurus '*Celina' – Fantastic autumn colour!

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Skimmia 'Rubella' – Great for dry shade and provides a great fragrance for late winter.

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*Skimmia* Magic Marlot' – Requires a good free draining soil (not peaty)

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Lonicera x purpusii 'Winter Beauty' – Excellent shrubby lonicera for dry shade.

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*Sarcococca confusa* – Makes a great alternative box hedge... perfect for dry shade.



Mahonia x media 'Winter Sun' – Good to deter burglars!

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Euonymus 'Silver Queen'

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Pittosporum 'Elizabeth' – Hardy pittosporum, during summer has creamy-white margin that turns pink in autumn/winter.

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*Pittosporum '*Tom Thumb'

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Experiment with leaving faded perennial flowers to provide architectural interest for winter. Miscanthus perform better if cut back until after winter.




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Euphorbia characias subsp. Wulfenii – Prune during April/May at base to encourage new growth and new flowers the following season.

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Euphorbia amygaloides 'Purpurea'

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*Bergania '*Overture' – Excellent clump forming Bergenia with foliage that turns plumb red in winter.



Helleborus x hybridus – Remove seedlings each year and mulch heavily after flowering (being careful not to cover the crown)

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*Iris reticulata '*Harmony' – *I find best planted in the green to avoid mice eating the bulbs during winter.*

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Galanthus nivalis – Works perfectly well when drifting through deciduous shrubs such as Cornus.

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Clematis cirrhosa var. balearica – Easy to grow winter flowering clematis.



Clematis armandii 'Enham Star' – Vigorous climber, requires a lot of space to be allowed to perform.
